A. On April 22, 1969, many black and Puerto Rican groups took over the main building of City College of New York. This demand started with students taking over the North Academic Center building to get the reactions of the current school president at the time, Buell Gallagher. With the university being stripped of its classes, and countless riots outside on campus, the university knew a proper proposal had to be confronted. President Buell Gallagher soon gave in and resigned and the protesters soon had their way.
